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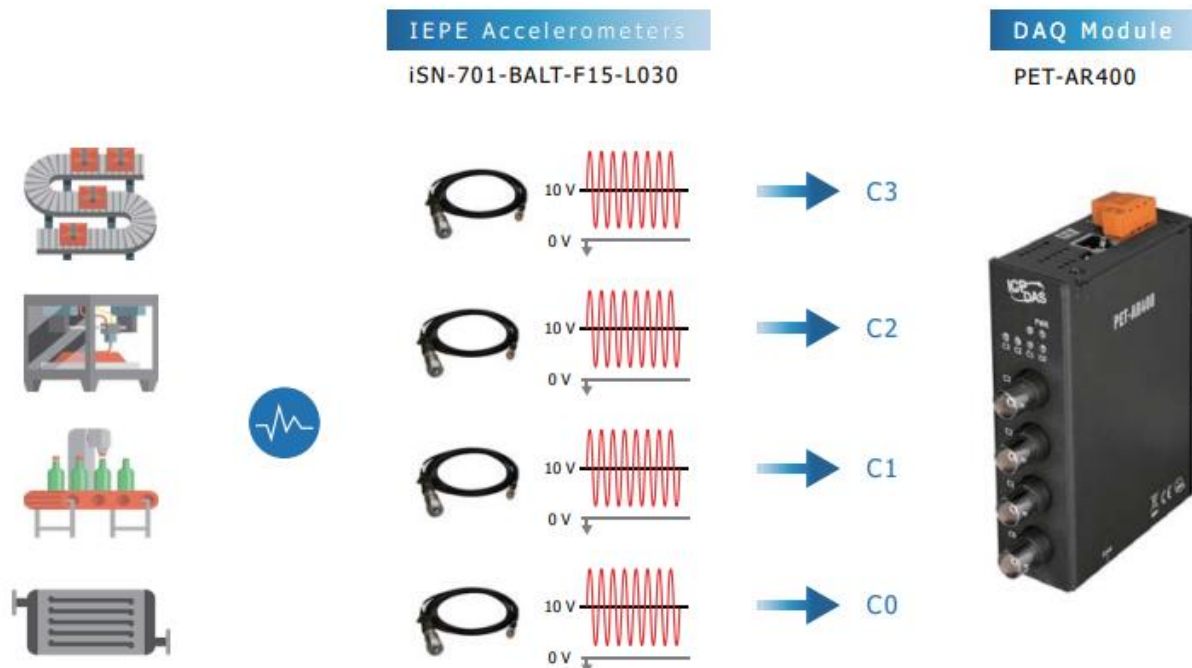
# 1. Introduction

The PET-AR400 is a high speed data acquisition device. The PET-AR400 built-in an Ethernet communication port for data transfer over the network and includes 4 IEPE inputs (128 kHz for 1 channel; 32 kHz for 4 channels) for measuring the signal from an IEPE accelerometer.

The PET-AR400 also provides 4 kV ESD protection as well as 2500 VDC intra-module isolation. In addition, the 24-bit ADC includes built-in Sinc3 filtering to adjust the appropriate sampling rate and filter out modulator and signal noise.

The PET-AR400 is not only suitable for a wide range of mobile/portable measurement applications, but also for precision signal measurement.

PET-AR400 supports many kinds of trigger modes for A/D conversion : software trigger, analog threshold trigger. The software trigger can acquire a sample whenever needed; The analog threshold trigger will collect data while the analog input value is higher or lower than specific voltage value.



## 1.1. Features

The PET-AR400 module offers the most comprehensive configuration to meet specific application requirements. The following list shows the features designed to simplify installation, configuration and application.

### • Data Acquisition Mode

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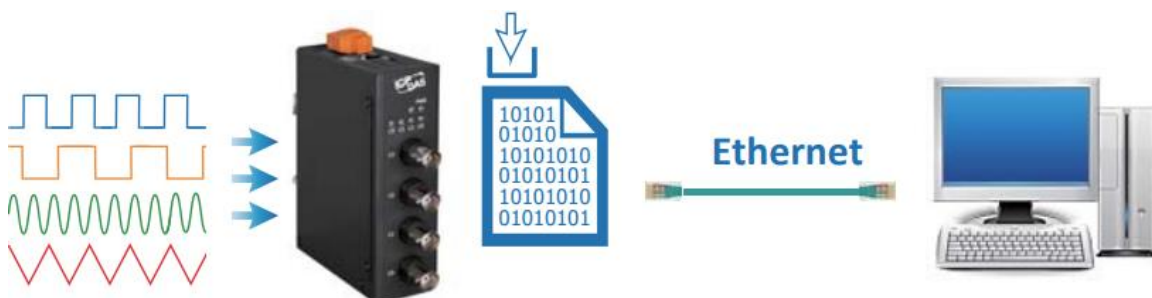
#### 1. Continuous Acquisition Mode

After starting A/D acquisition, data is continuously transmitted to the Host PC.



#### 2. N-samples Acquisition Mode

- a. After starting A/D acquisition, the data will be temporarily stored in the memory and wait until the host PC send a transmit command, once the module received the command, it start transferring data to the host PC.
- b. The memory capacity allows temporary storage of up to 15 million data samples.



## • A/D Trigger Mode

### 1. Software trigger mode

After the acquisition parameters are configured by the PC and the trigger command is send, the A/D starts to acquire data.

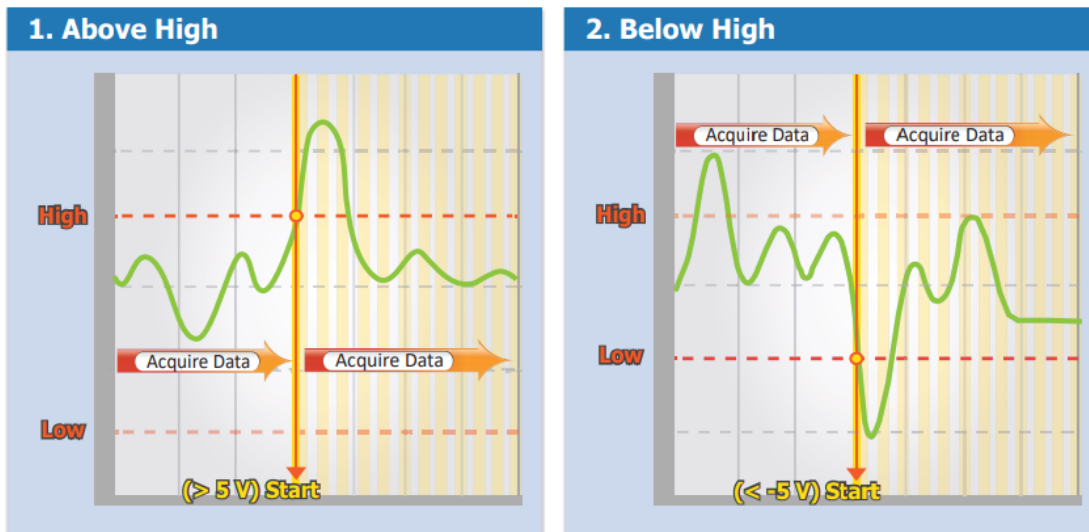
### 2. Analog threshold trigger mode

After the acquisition parameters are configured by the PC and the start command is send, the A/D waits for the input voltage signal to meet the trigger condition, after the signal reach the condition, it starts to collect data

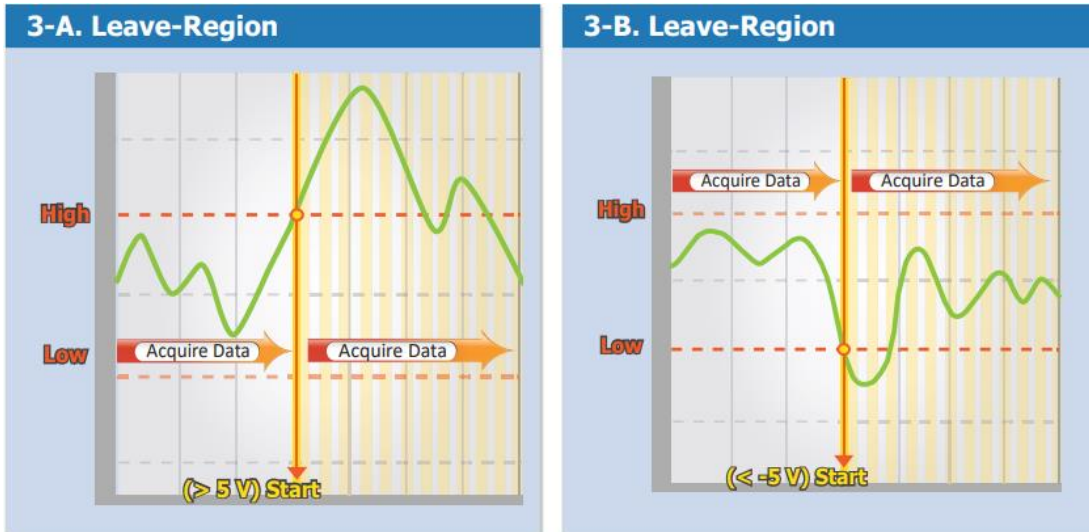
The analog threshold trigger can be used to detect the instantaneous change in a continuous voltage signal.

The user can specify the trigger condition and range.

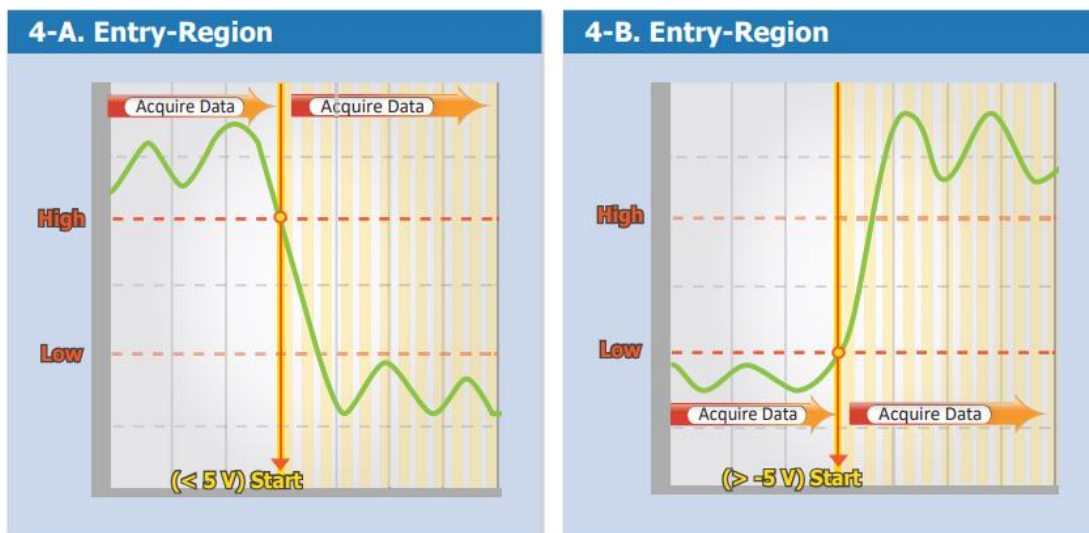
1. Above High : A/D starts to acquire data, once the signal is higher than the high level.
2. Below Low : A/D starts to acquire data, once the signal is lower than the high level.



3. Leave-region : A/D starts to acquire data, once the signal is out of range.



4. Entry-region : A/D starts to acquire data, once the signal is in the range.



#### • Modbus/TCP Protocol

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The Modbus/TCP slave function on the Ethernet port can be used to provide data to remote HMI/SCADA software built with Modbus/TCP driver.

#### • Automatic MD/MDI-X Crossover for Plug-and-play MDI/MDI-X

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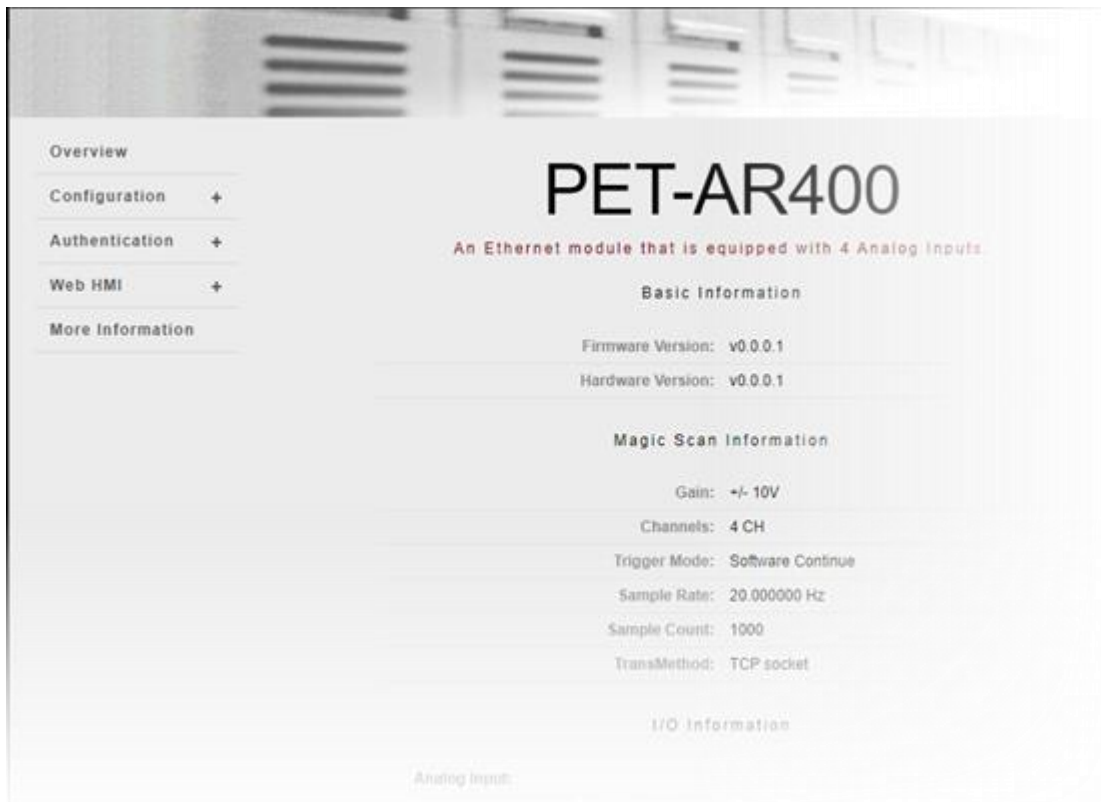
RJ-45 port supports automatic MDI/MDI-x that can automatically detect the type of connection to the Ethernet device without requiring special straight or crossover cables.



## • Built-in Web Server

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Each PET-AR400 module has a built-in web server that allows users to easily configure, monitor and control the module from a remote location using a regular web browser



## • Communication Security

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Account and password are required when logging into the PET-AR400 web server. An IP address filter is also included, which can be used to allow or deny connections with specific IP addresses.

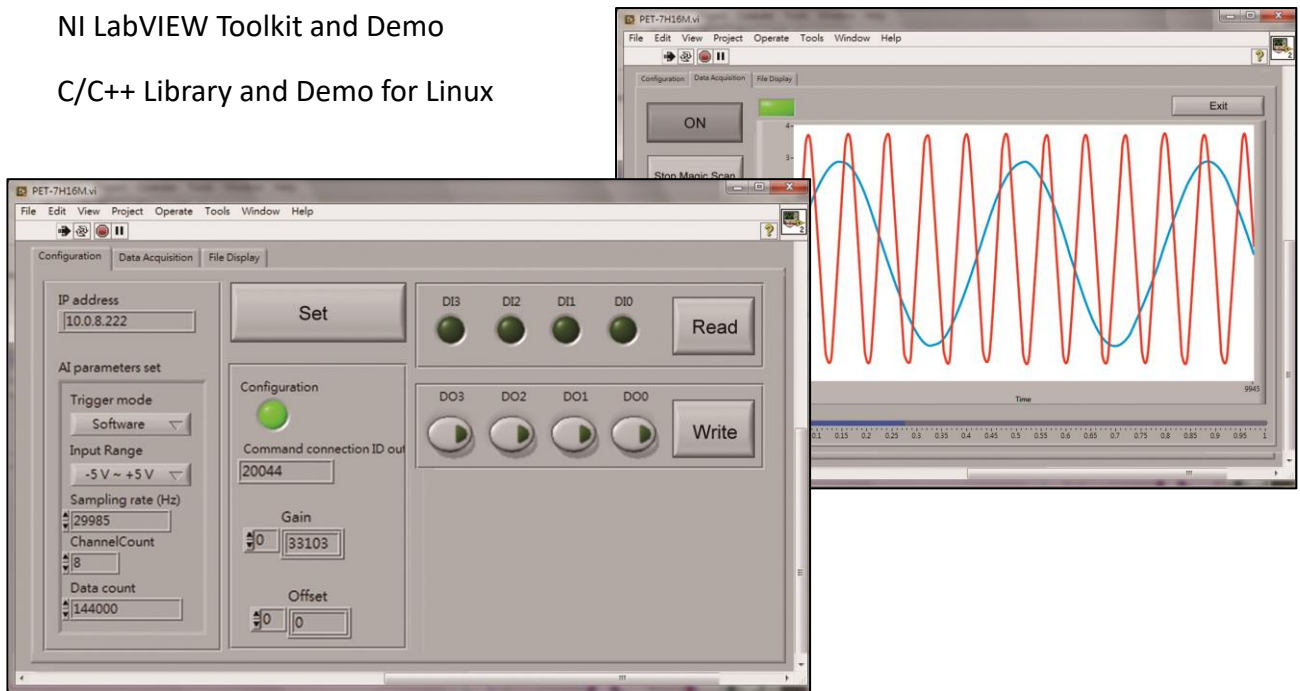

## • Highly Reliable Under Harsh Environment

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PET-AR400 is housed in a metal shell/case with a column-like ventilator that helps to cool the working environment inside the shell/case.

- Operating Temperature : -25 ~ +75 °C

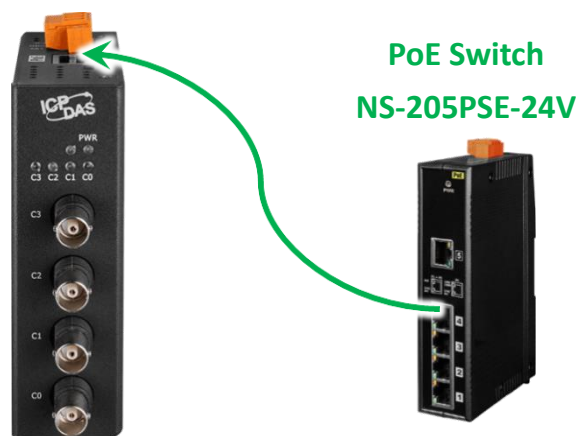
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PET-AR400 feature true IEEE 802.3af-compliant (classification, Class 2) Power over Ethernet (PoE) using both Ethernet pairs (Category 5 Ethernet cable), it allows power and data to be carried over a single Ethernet cable, so a device can operate solely from the power it receives through the data cable.

This innovation allows greater flexibility in office design, higher efficiency in systems design, and faster turnaround time in set-up and implementation.

The PET-AR400 can receive power from an auxiliary power sources like AC adapters and battery in addition to the PoE enabled network.

This is a desirable feature when the total system power requirements exceed the PSE's(power sourcing equipment) load capacity. Furthermore, with the auxiliary power option, PET-AR400 can be used in a standard Ethernet (non-PoE) system.



When using PoE devices like PET-AR400, user can choose ICP DAS“PoE switch” —“NS-205PSE-24V”as the power source, it can automatically detect the connected devices whether they are PoE devices. This mechanism ensures NS-205PSE-24V to work with both PoE and non-PoE devices coordinately at the same time.

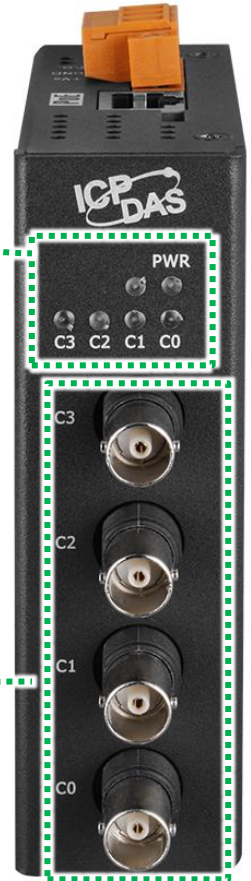
# 1.3. Overview

PET-AR400 is equipped with several interfaces and peripherals that can be integrated with external systems. Here is an overview of the components and its descriptions.

## • LED Indicators

PET-AR400 has 2 system LED indicators and 4 I/O LED indicators. The table below shows the definition of each LED indicator.

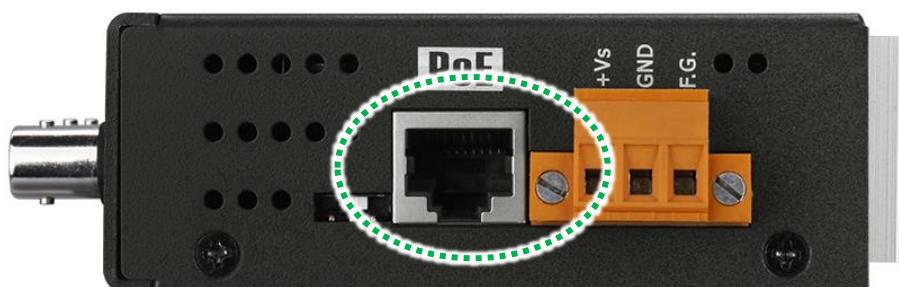


## • IEPE Input

PET-AR400 has 4 IEPE input channels, the IEPE input uses a BNC adapter (female), and only needs to connect the BNC adapter (male) when wiring.

## • PoE Port

PET-AR400 has a PoE port that can power to PET-AR400 over the Ethernet cable. This eliminates the need for separate power cables and allows for easier installation and maintenance of the PET-AR400.



## • Reset Button

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The PET-AR400 has a reset button on the bottom of the PET-AR400. This reset button can be pressed to reset the PET-AR400 to its default settings.

If the reset button is pressed for at least 5 seconds, the PET-AR400 will perform a factory reset and reboot.

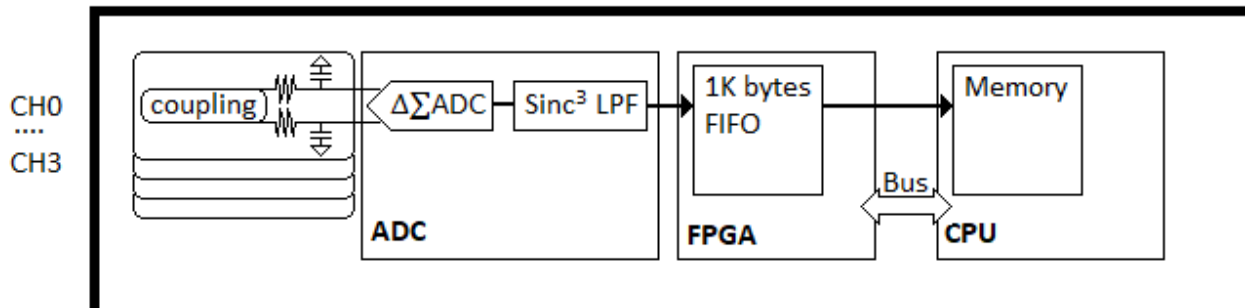

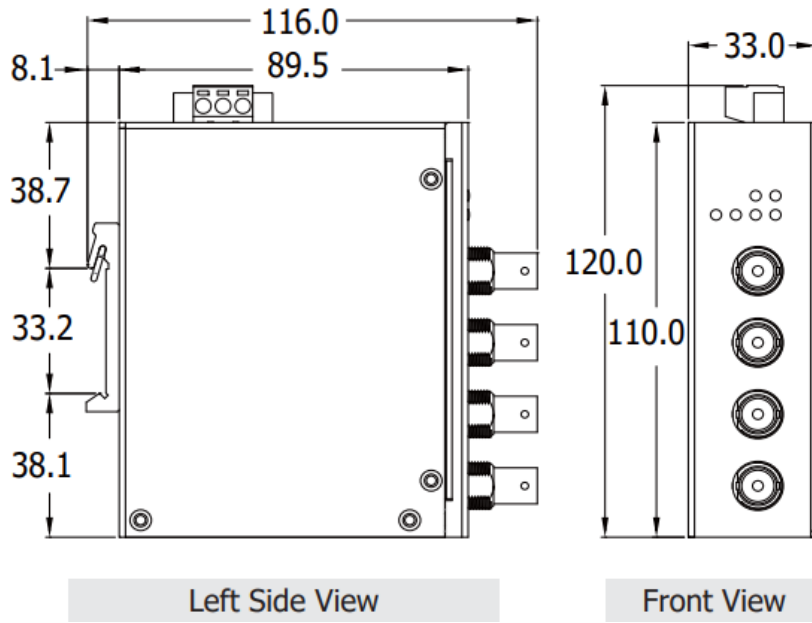
The block diagram of the PET-AR400 system is shown below.

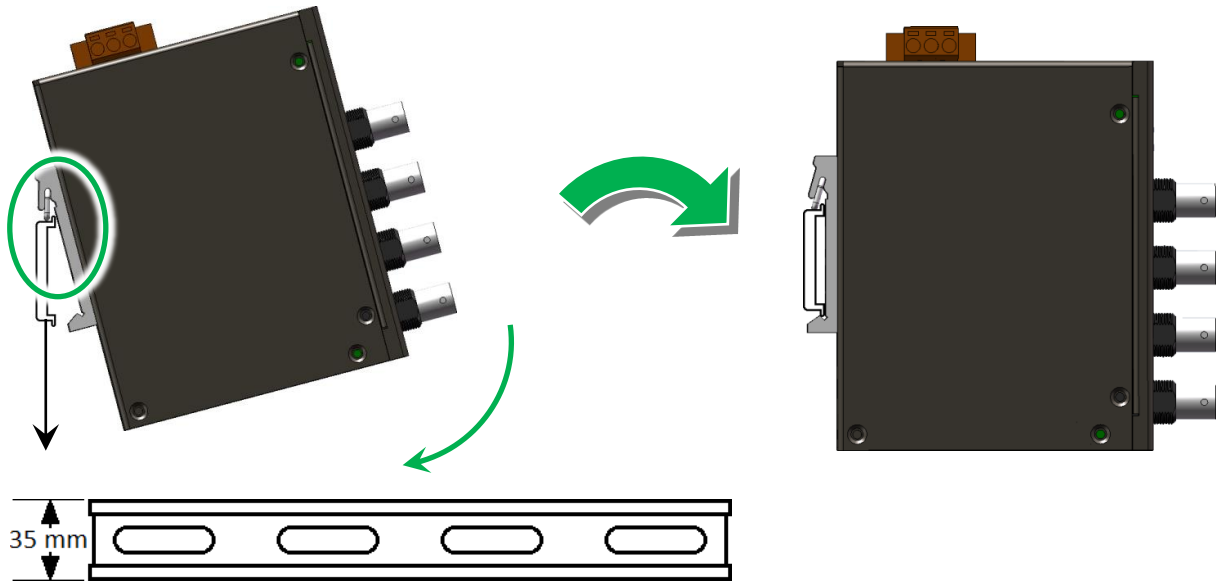

## 2.2. Mounting the PET-AR400

PET-AR400 comes with a guide rail clip that makes it easy to install on a standard 35 mm DIN rail.

**Step 1 : Hook the upper tab over the upper flange of the DIN-Rail**

**Step 2 : Tilt the module toward the DIN-Rail until it snaps securely to rail**

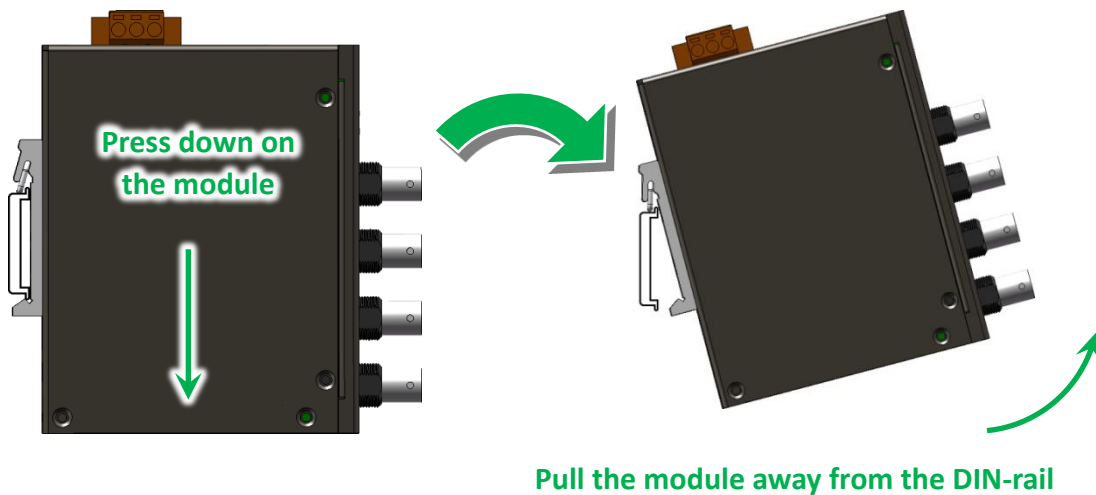

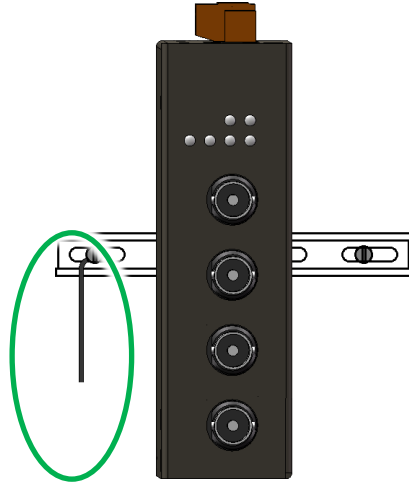


**To remove the module from DIN-Rail**

Gently press down on the module and then pull the bottom of the module away from the DIN-rail clip to remove it.



### Step 3 : Mount the ground screw and wiring the ground cable



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#### Tips & Warnings



A good ground reference (earth ground) is essential for proper operation of the PET-AR400. One side of all control circuits, power circuits and the ground lead must be properly connected to earth ground by either installing a ground rod in close proximity to the enclosure or by connecting to the incoming power system ground. There must be a single-point ground (i.e. copper bus bar) for all devices in the enclosure that require an earth ground.

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## 2.3. Powering on and Connecting to the PET-AR400

There are two ways to power on the PET-AR400, either through a PoE switch or an external power source.

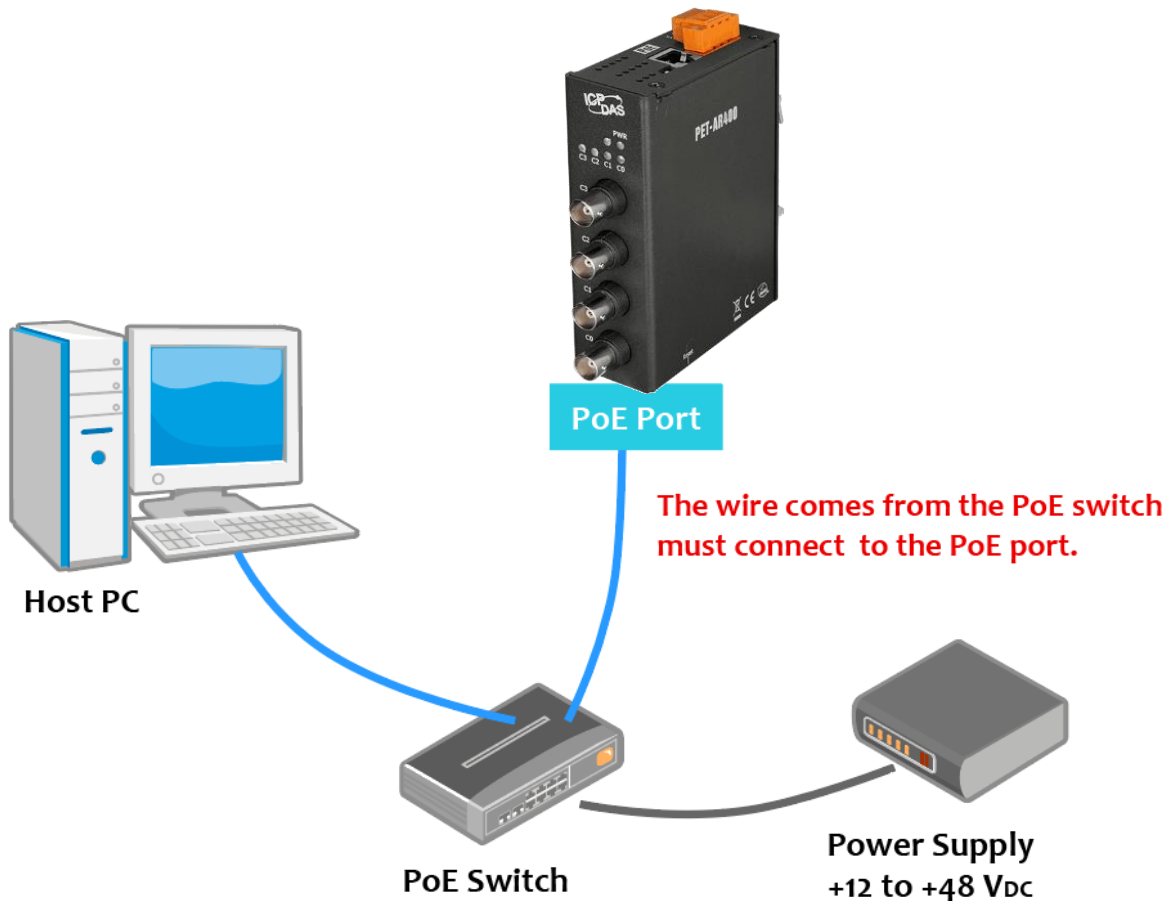
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- The external power supply should be within the range of +12 ~ +48 VDC.
  - PET-AR400 is equipped with a power indicator to check the power supply status.

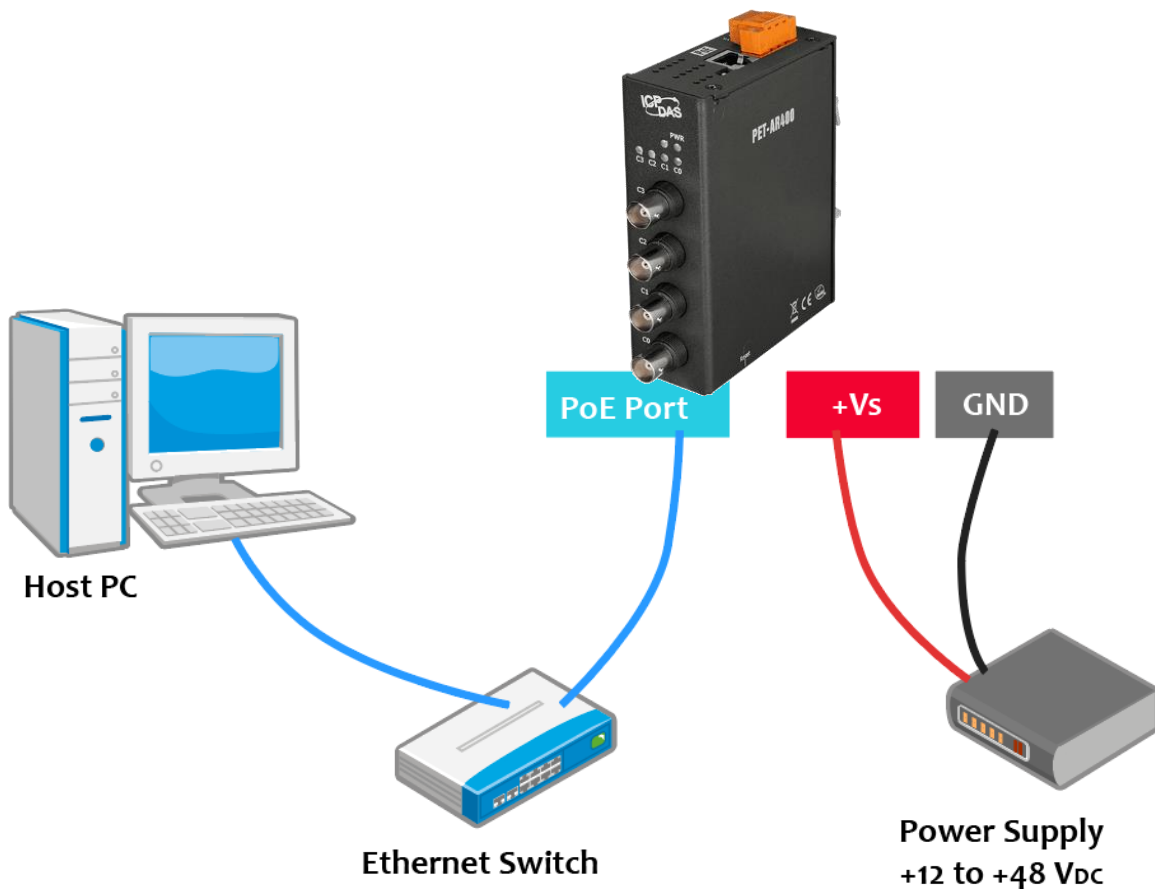
### Power on the PET-AR400 through a PoE switch

- i. Connect the PET-AR400 to the PoE switch via the Ethernet cable.
- ii. Connect the PC to the PoE switch via the Ethernet cable.
- iii. Wire the power supply to the PoE Switch



## Power on the PET-AR400 through an external power source

- i. Connect the PET-AR400 to the switch via the Ethernet cable.
- ii. Connect the PC to the switch via the Ethernet cable.
- iii. Wire the power supply to the PET-AR400.



## 2.4. Installing the HSDAQ Utility





HSDAQ Utility is a user-friendly software utility. It provides functions such as updating the operating system, data acquisition and download, firmware update, and Ethernet configuration. By using this software, users can easily configure and manage the data of PET-AR400, improving operational efficiency and convenience.

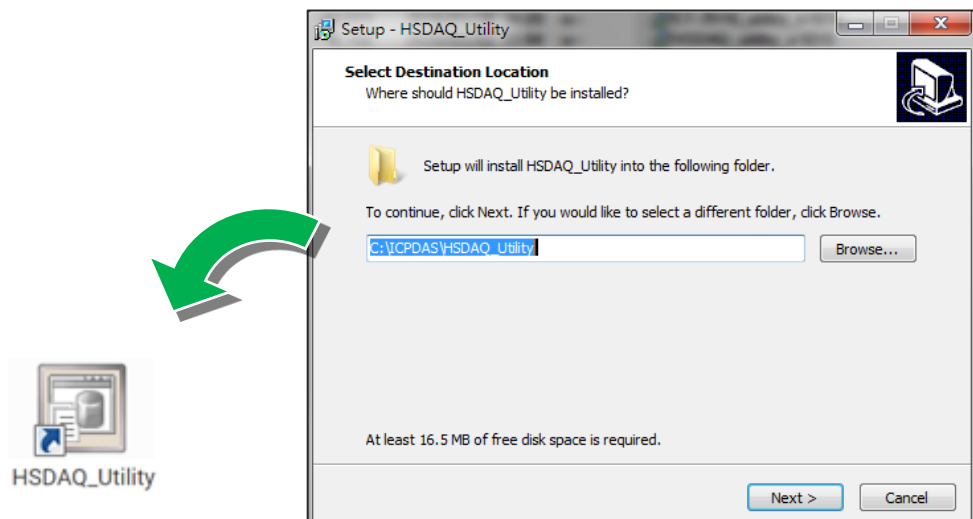

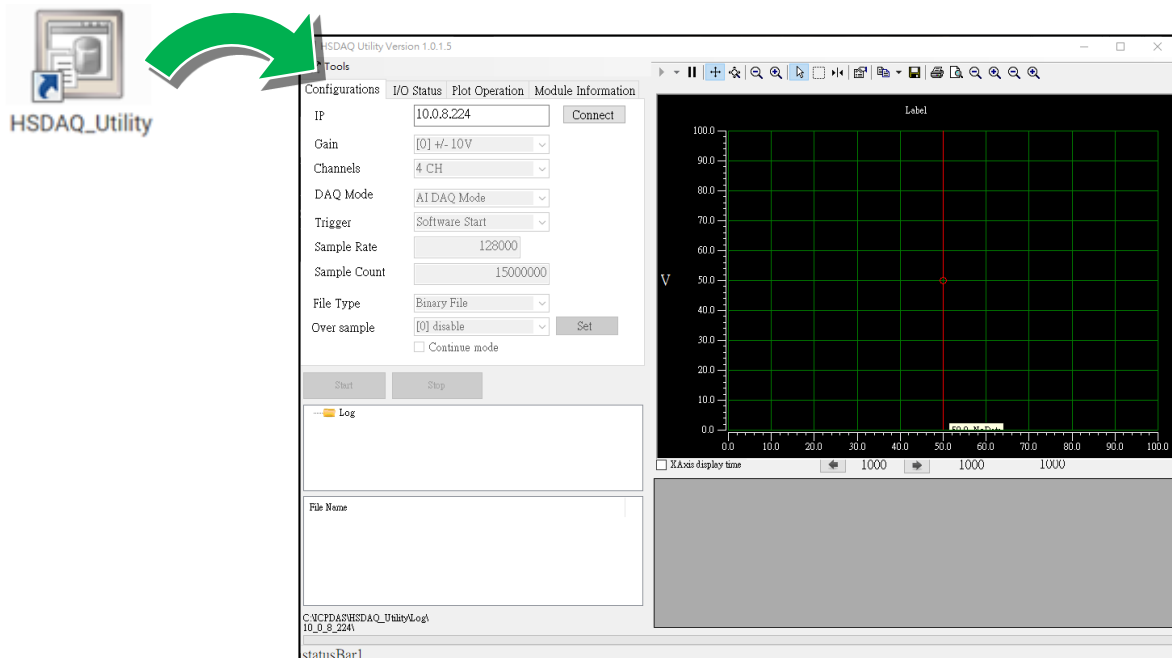
## 2.5. Assigning an IP address

PET-AR400 is an Ethernet device, which comes with a default IP address. Therefore, user must assign a new IP address.

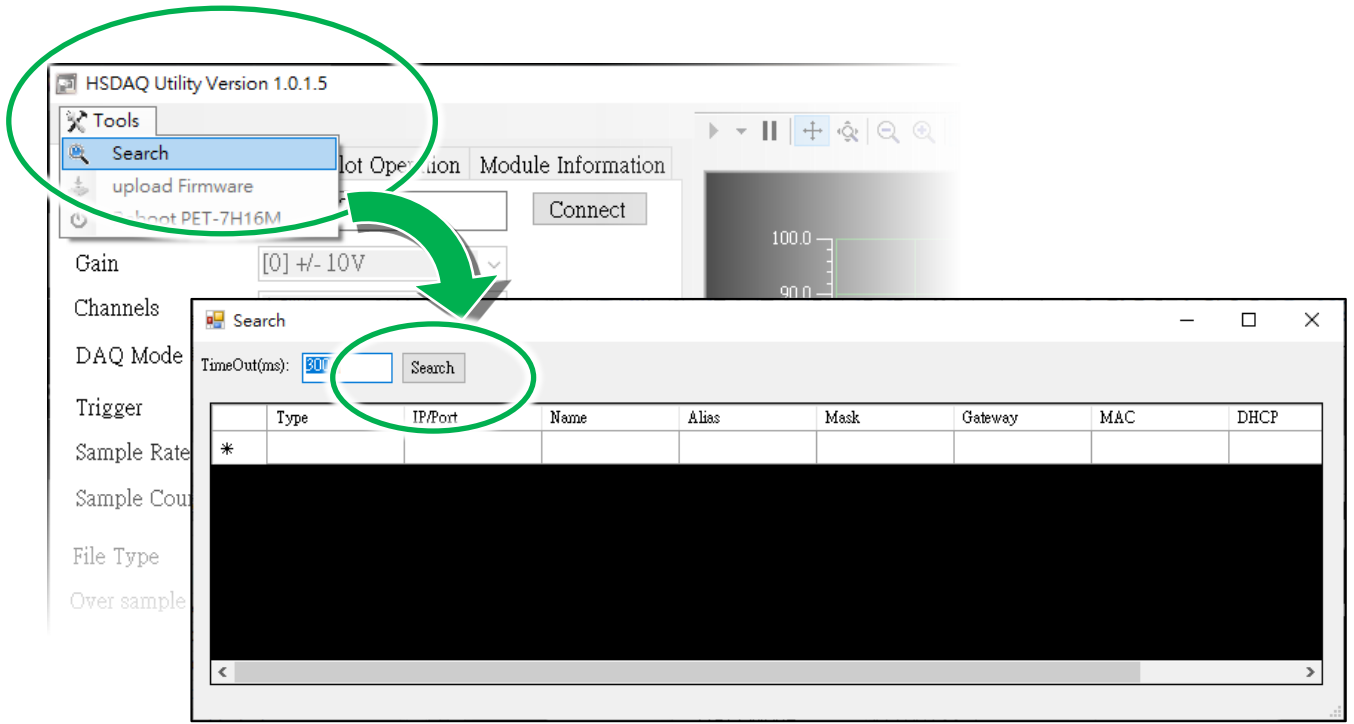




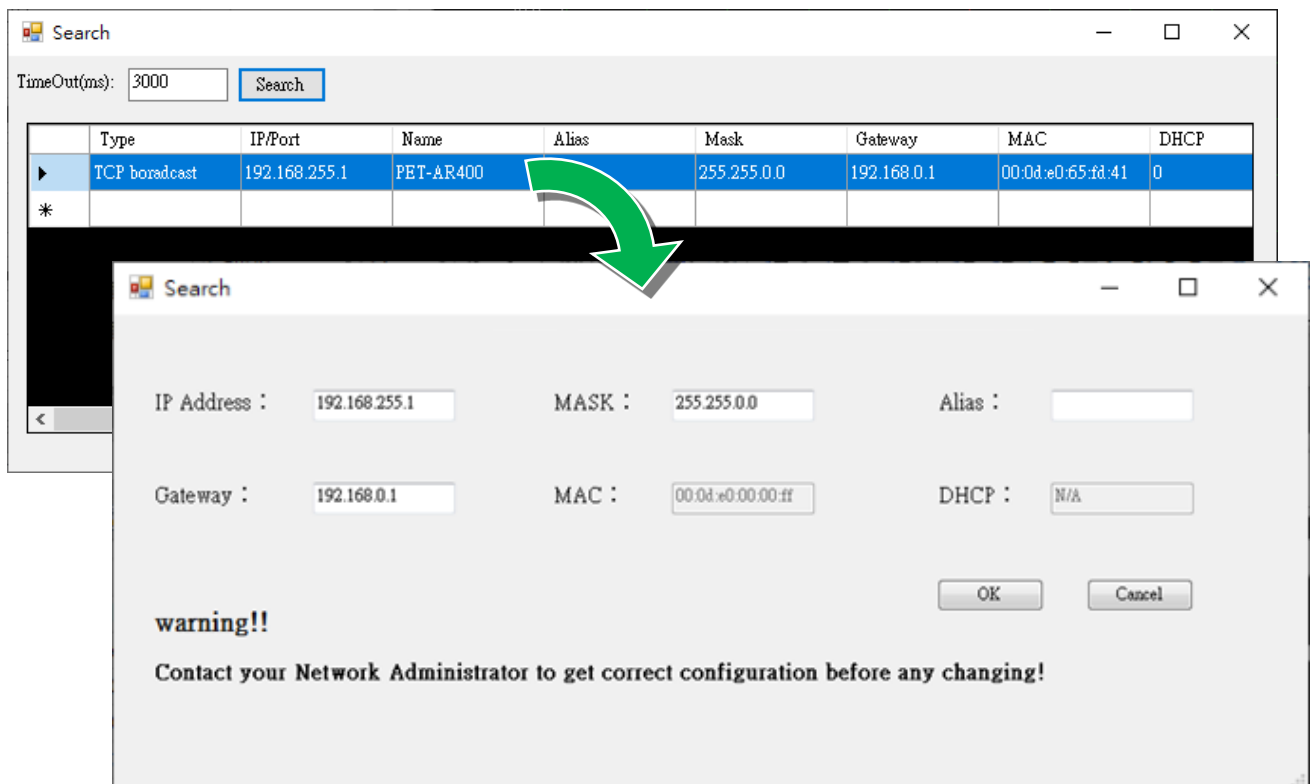
## Step 2. Choose the Search option from the Tools menu

## Step 3. Click the Search button to start searching the module



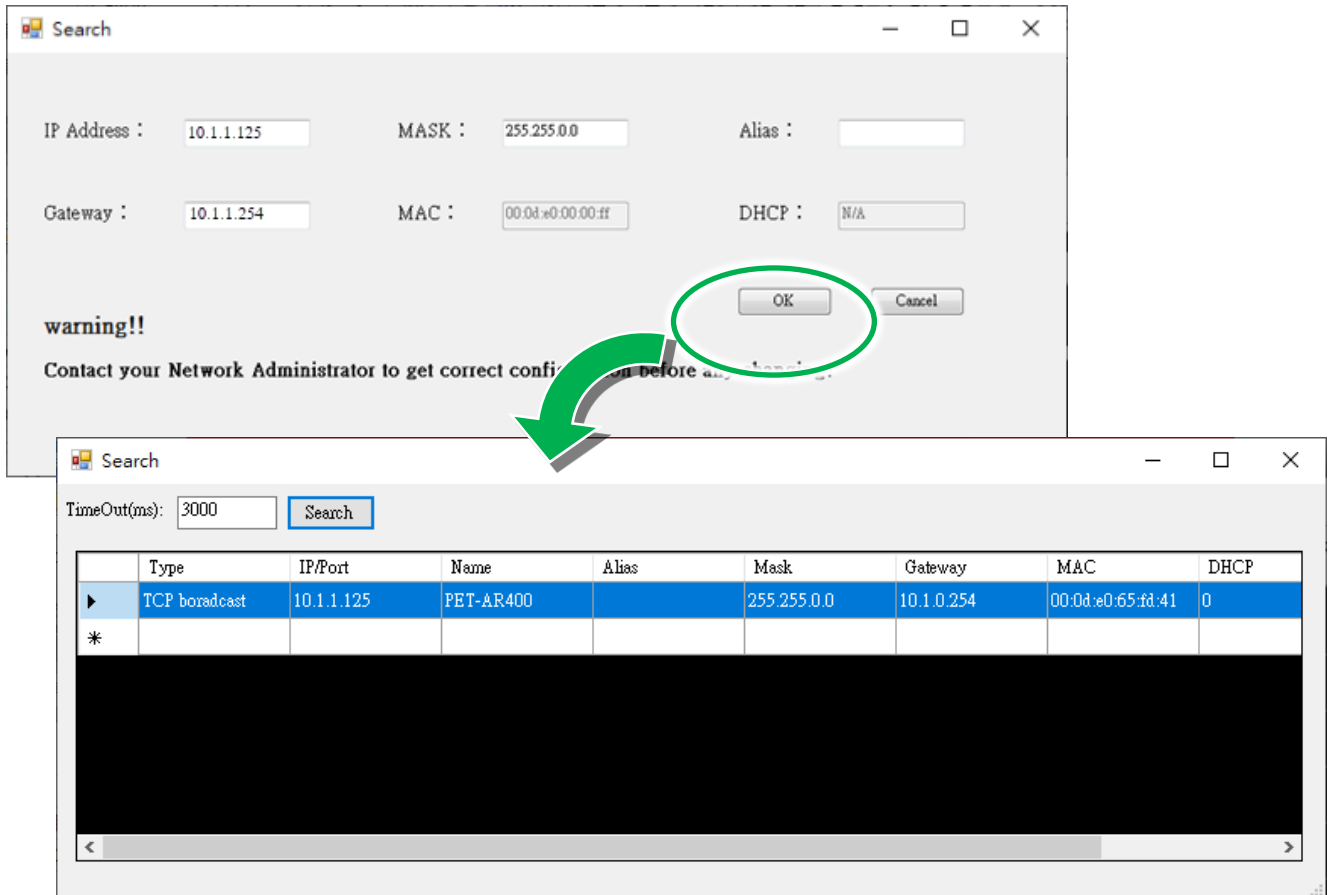
## Step 4. Click the 192.168.255.1 of the IP/Port field in the list

Once the appropriate values have been entered, click the "OK" button to save the settings.

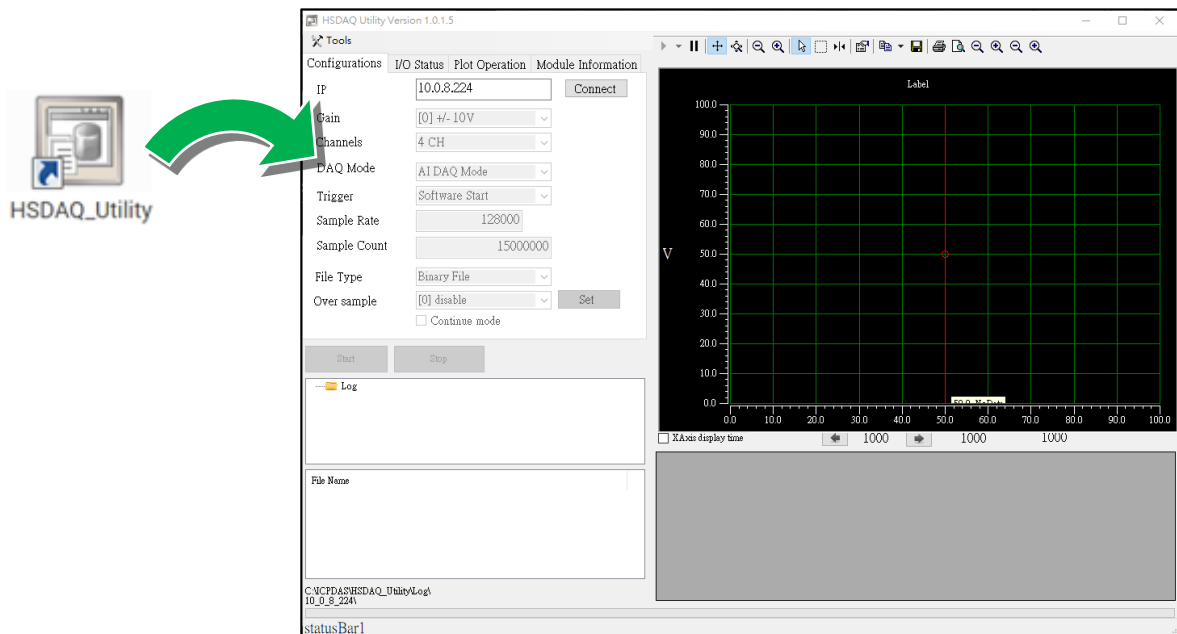


## 2.6. Acquiring and Analyzing Data

HSDAQ Utility allows users to set the data acquisition mode, control the data acquisition process, and realize the data storage and real-time display.

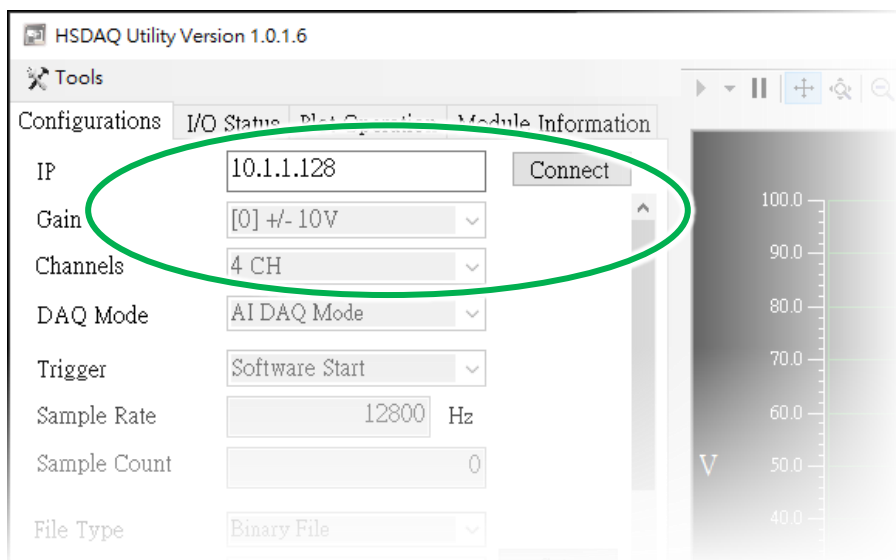

Enter the IP address in the IP field, and then click the Connect button to connect to the PET-AR400.



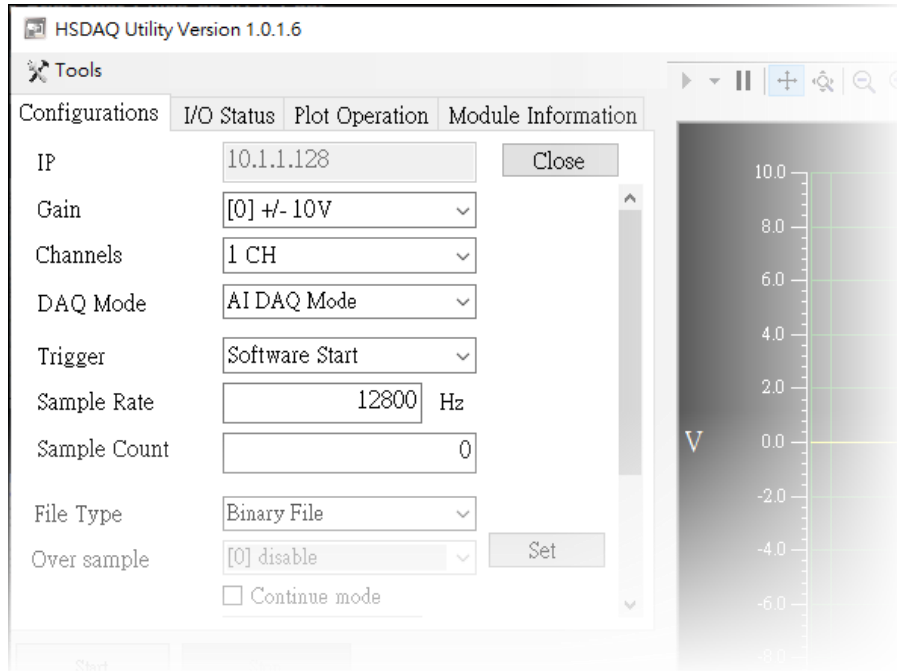
### Step 3 : Set the Data Acquisition Mode

PET-AR400 offers two data acquisition modes : one is continuous real-time acquisition mode triggered by software commands, and the other is N sample acquisition mode is activated When the analog input exceeds the specified threshold value.

#### To set the data acquisition mode to Continuous Acquisition mode

To set the data acquisition mode to continuous acquisition mode, you need to configure the following settings:

- **Channels** : Select the number of channel to be enabled.
- **Trigger** : Select **Software Start** as the trigger type.
- **Sample Rate** : Specify a value of the sample rate from 0 to 128000.
- **Sample Count** : Specify a value of the target sample from 0 to 15000000. 0 means keep collecting data until stop command is received.



## To set the data acquisition mode to N Sample Acquisition mode

To set the data acquisition mode to N sample acquisition mode, you need to configure the following parameters:

In **Configurations** tab

- **Channels** : Select the number of channel to be enabled.
- **Trigger** : Select **Analog threshold trigger** as the trigger type.
- **Sample Rate** : Specify a value of the sample rate from 0 to 128000.
- **Sample Count** : Specify a value of the target sample from 0 to 15000000. 0 means keep collecting data until stop command is received.

In **Analog Setting** tab

- **High Level/Low Level** : Specify a value of the analog threshold trigger high/low level from +10 to -10.
- **AI Mode** : Select the analog threshold trigger conditional and specify a value of the left/right count.

### 3. Data Acquisition Modes

PET-AR400 offers two data acquisition modes : one is continuous real-time acquisition mode triggered by software commands, and the other is N sample acquisition mode is activated when the analog input exceeds the specified threshold value.

The table below shows the sampling frequency of each acquisition mode, including the total number of channels sampled simultaneously and the maximum sampling rate for each channel.

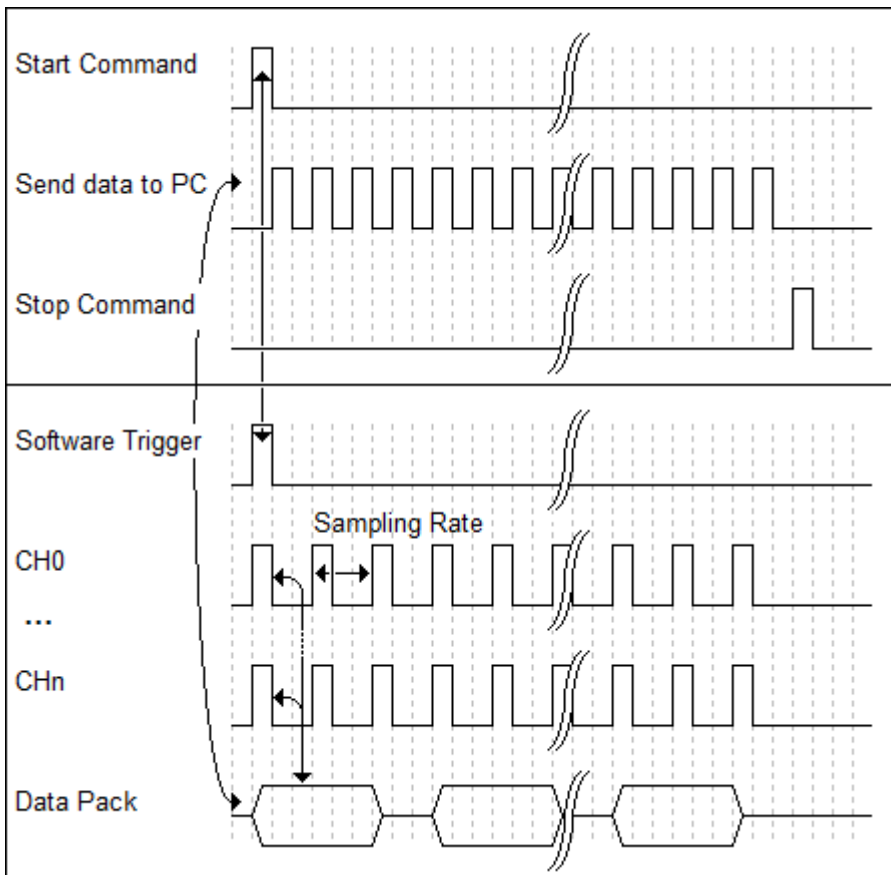

### 3.1. Continuous Acquisition

The Continuous Acquisition Mode is triggered by software command.

In continuous acquisition mode with software command triggering, when the PC sends a start command to the PET-AR400, the module will begin to gather data. Once the data accumulates to a certain size, it will be sent back to the PC. The data collection process will continue until the PC sends a stop command or until the desired amount of data has been collected.



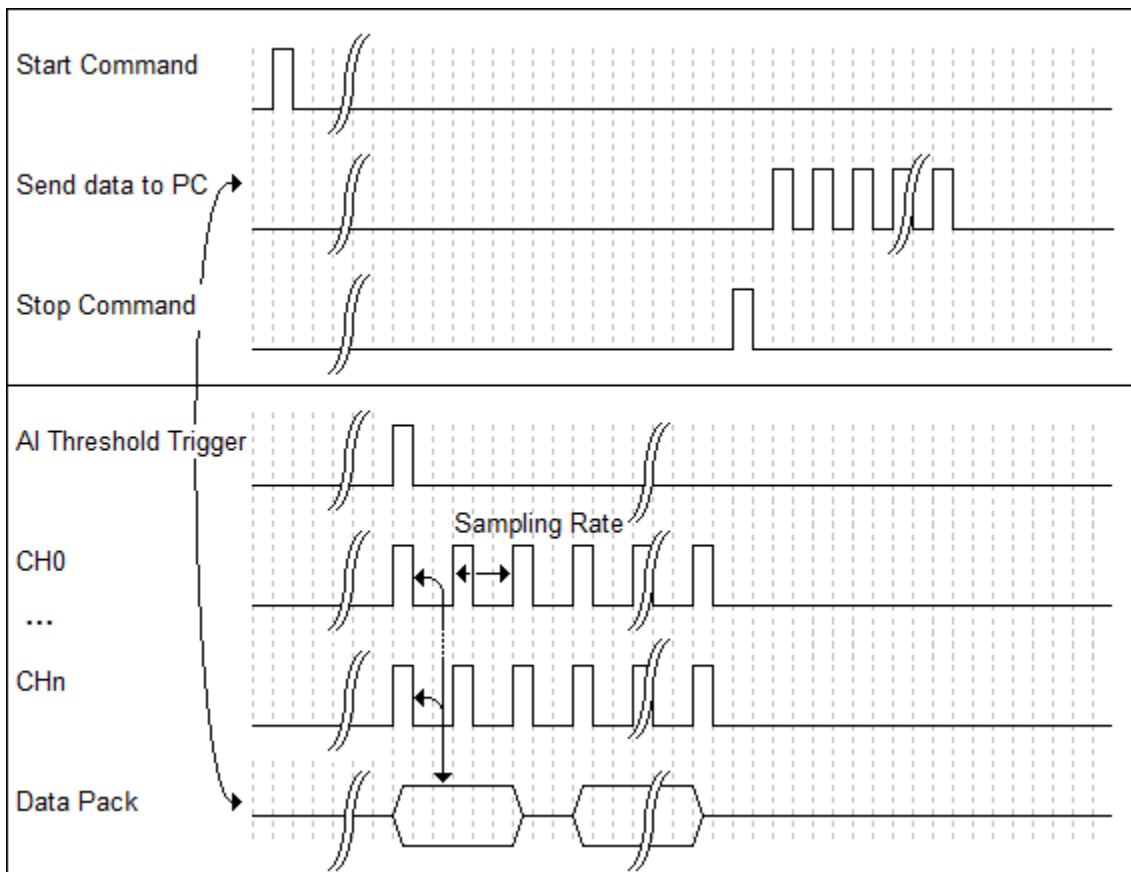
In **Continuous Acquisition** Mode, the following parameters need to be specified:

- **Channels** : Select the number of channel to be enabled.
- **Trigger** : Select **Software Start** as the trigger type.
- **Sample Rate** : Specify a value of the sample rate from 0 to 128000.
- **Sample Count** : Specify a value of the target sample from 0 to 1500000. 0 means keep collecting data until stop command is received.



## 3.2. N-Sample Acquisition

N sample acquisition mode is activated when the analog input exceeds the specified threshold value. The analog threshold trigger is activated when the input signal exceeds a set voltage value, either higher or lower. This trigger can also be utilized to detect instantaneous changes in a continuous voltage signal. The user has the flexibility to specify the desired trigger condition.



In **N-Sample Acquisition** Mode, the following parameters need to be specified:

- **Channels** : Select the number of channel to be enabled.
- **Trigger** : Select **Analog threshold trigger** as the trigger type.
- **Sample Rate** : Specify a value of the sample rate from 0 to 128000.
- **Sample Count** : Specify a value of the target sample from 0 to 15000000. 0 means keep collecting data until stop command is received.
- **High Level/Low Level** : Specify a value of the analog threshold trigger high/low level from +10 to -10.
- **AI Mode** : Select the analog threshold trigger conditional and specify a value of the left/right count.

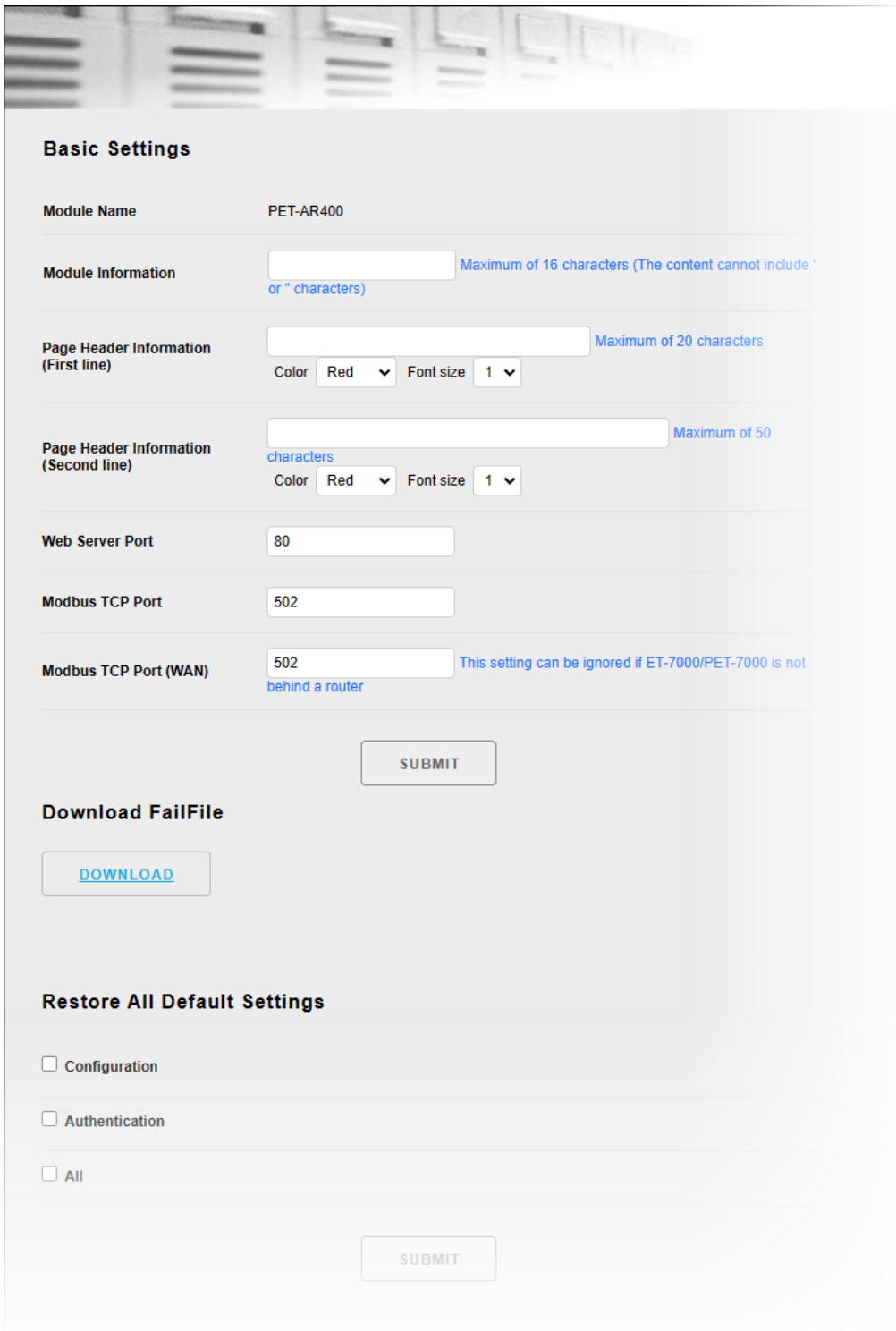

### 4.2.2.3. Configuring the Command port and data transmit port

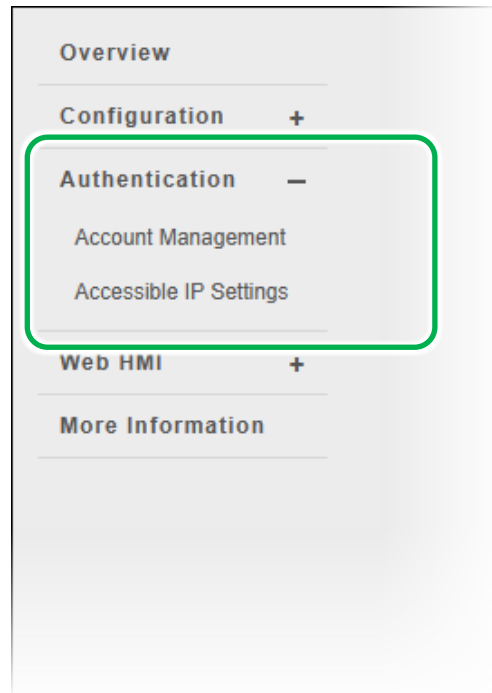

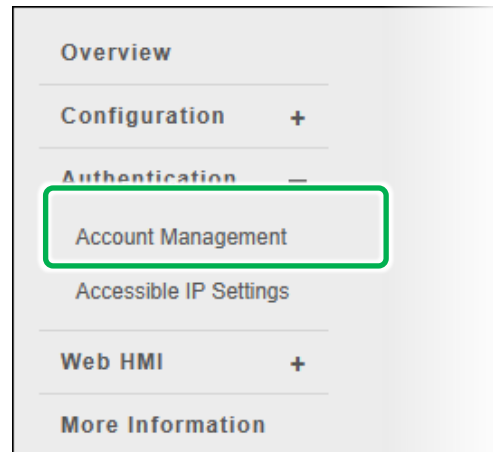

### 4.3.1.1. Configuring the user accounts

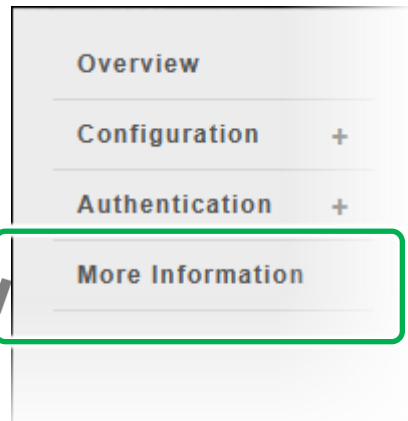

## 5. Modbus Application

Modbus is a communication protocol that was developed by Modicon Inc. in 1979, and was originally designed for use with Modicon controllers. Detailed information regarding the Modbus protocol can be found at: <http://www.modbus.org>.

The different versions of the Modbus protocol used today include Modbus RTU, which is based on serial communication interfaces such as RS-485 and RS-232, Modbus ASCII and Modbus TCP, which uses the Modbus RTU protocol embedded into TCP packets.

Modbus TCP is an internet protocol. The protocol embeds a Modbus frame into a TCP frame so that a connection oriented approach is obtained, thereby making it more reliable. The master queries the slave and the slave responds with a reply. The protocol is open and, hence, highly scalable.

### Modbus Message Structure

Modbus devices communicate using a master-slave (client-server) technique in which only one device (the master/client) can initiate transactions (called queries). The other devices (slaves/servers) respond by either supplying the requested data to the master, or by taking the action requested in the query.

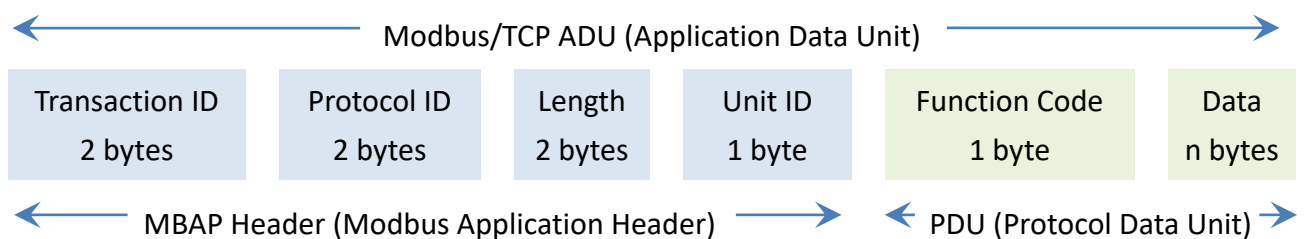
A query from a master will consist of a slave address (or broadcast address), a function code defining the requested action, any required data, and an error checking field. A response from a slave consists of fields confirming the action taken, any data to be returned, and an error checking field.

## 5.1. Modbus/TCP Interface

Modbus TCP/IP uses port 502 to listen and receive Modbus messages over Ethernet.

## 5.2. Modbus/TCP Data Frame

The complete Modbus/TCP ADU (Application Data Unit) is embedded into the data field of a standard TCP frame and sent via TCP on port 502. The Modbus/TCP ADU is shown below.



### MBAP Header

The MBAP is a 7-byte header that contains the following information:

**Transaction ID** : 2 bytes are set by the Master to uniquely identify each request.

**Protocol ID** : 2 bytes are set by the Master, will always be 00 00, which corresponds to the Modbus protocol.

**Length** : 2 bytes are set by the Master, identifying the number of bytes in the message that follow. It is counted from Unit Identifier to the end of the message.

**Unit ID** : 1 byte is set to Master. It is repeated by the Slave device to uniquely identify the Slave device. Available unit identifier is in the range of 0 to 247. Unit identifier 0 is used for general broadcast, while unit identifier 1 to 247 is given to individual Modbus devices.

### Function Code

The function code field of a Modbus data unit is coded in one byte. Valid codes are in the range of 1 ... 255 decimal (the range 128 - 255 is reserved and used for exception responses). When a Modbus request is sent from a Modbus Client to a Server device the function code field tells the Server what kind of action to perform.

The table below shows the mapping between the function code and the register number for the PET-AR400.

### Data

Data is transmitted in 8-bit, 16-bit and 32-bit format.

The data for 16-bit registers is transmitted in high-byte first format.

For example: 0x0A0B ==> 0x0A, 0x0B.

The data for 32-bit registers is transmitted as two 16-bit registers, and is low-word first.

For example: 0x0A0B0C0D ==> 0x0C, 0x0D, 0x0A, 0x0B.

The data field may be nonexistent (of zero length) in certain kinds of requests; in this case the server does not require any additional information. The function code alone specifies the action.

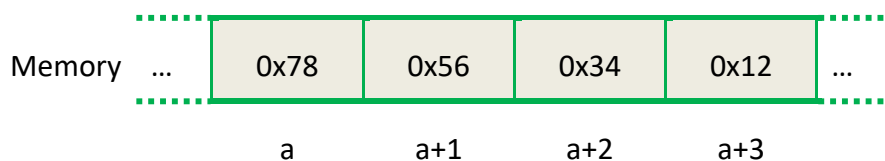

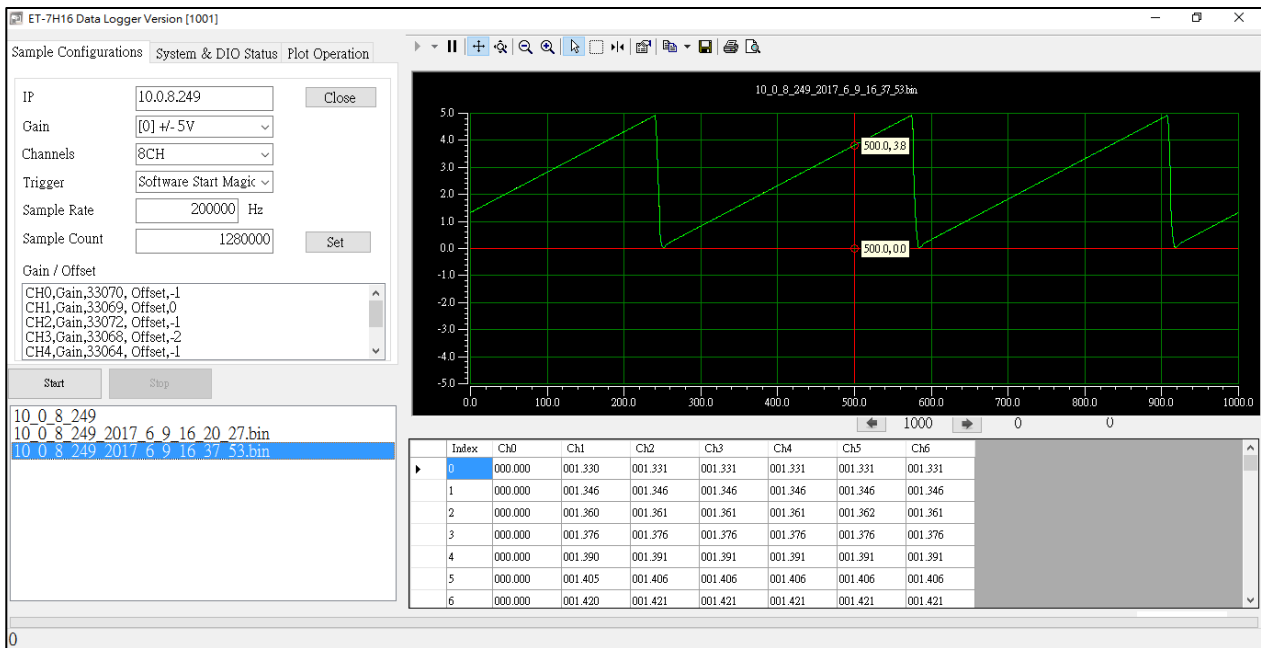


## 6.2. HSDAQ Utility

HSDAQ Utility is used to graphically display and easily data logging for PET-AR400.

When connect to the module, it will get the gain and offset values of calibration and the configurations of sampling.

Once sampling has started, it will start collecting data from the module and saving the data to a file. Select the log file and the data will be show on the plot view.

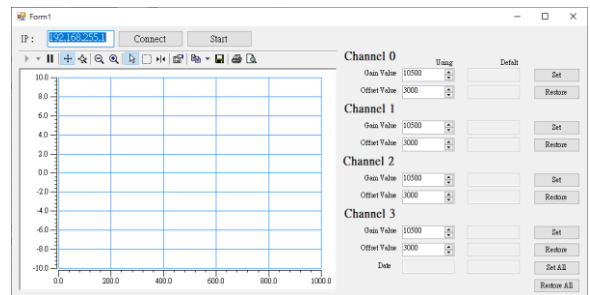
## 8. Calibration

PET-AR400 is calibrated and the calibration parameters, including the gain value and offset value, are stored in EEPROM when it is shipped. However, in certain extreme environments, more accurate voltage measurement may be required. In this case, a visual manual calibration method is provided.

### Step 1 : Prepare a high-precision signal generator and download the calibration software

The precision of the signal generator is the higher the better. The calibration tool can be obtained from:

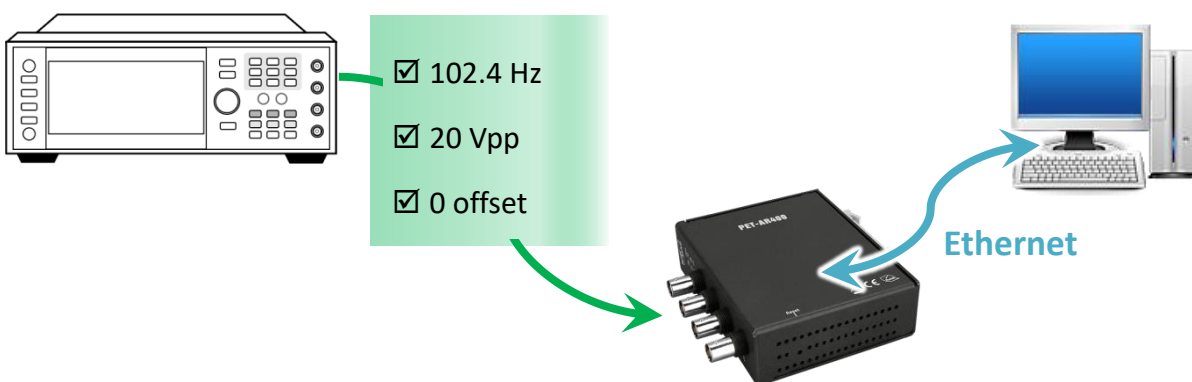

### Step 2 : Connect the signal generator to the channel to be calibrated

### Step 3 : Set the output of the signal generator

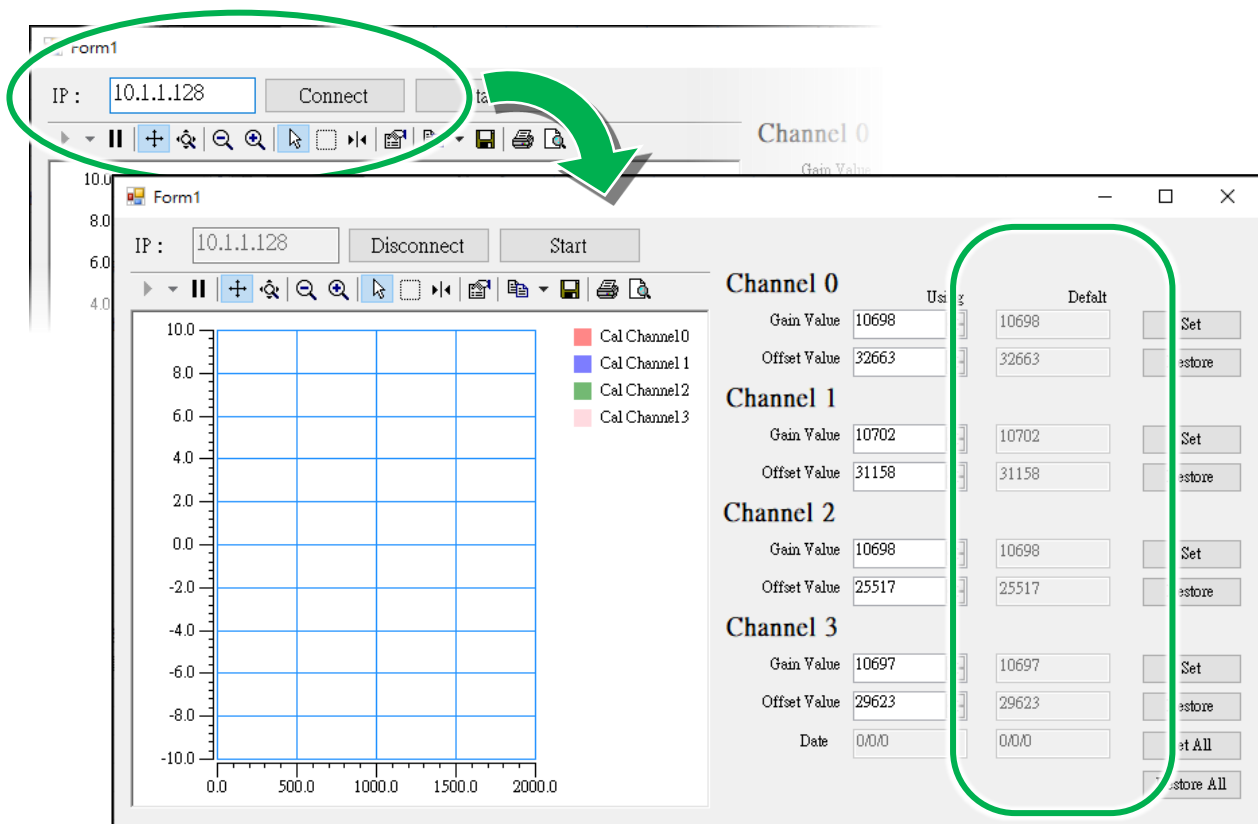
Set the signal generator to output a 102.4 Hz, 20Vpp sine wave to the channel that needs calibration.



#### Step 4 : Run the calibration software and connect to PET-AR400 by using the IP address

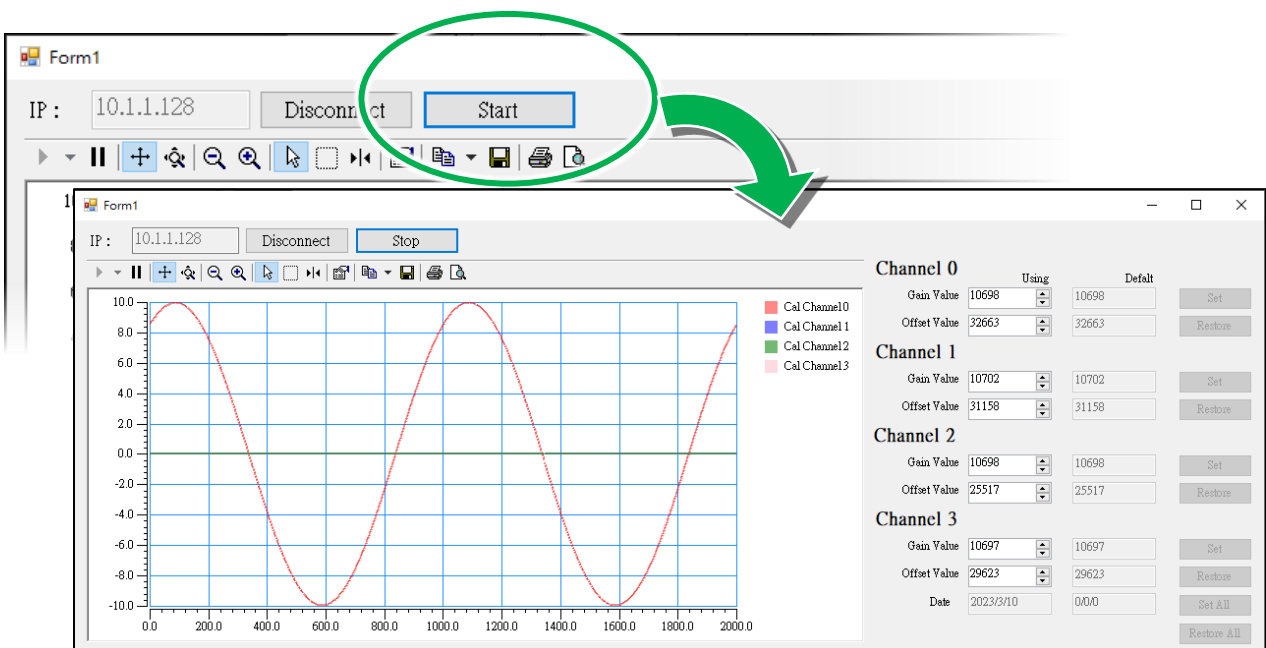

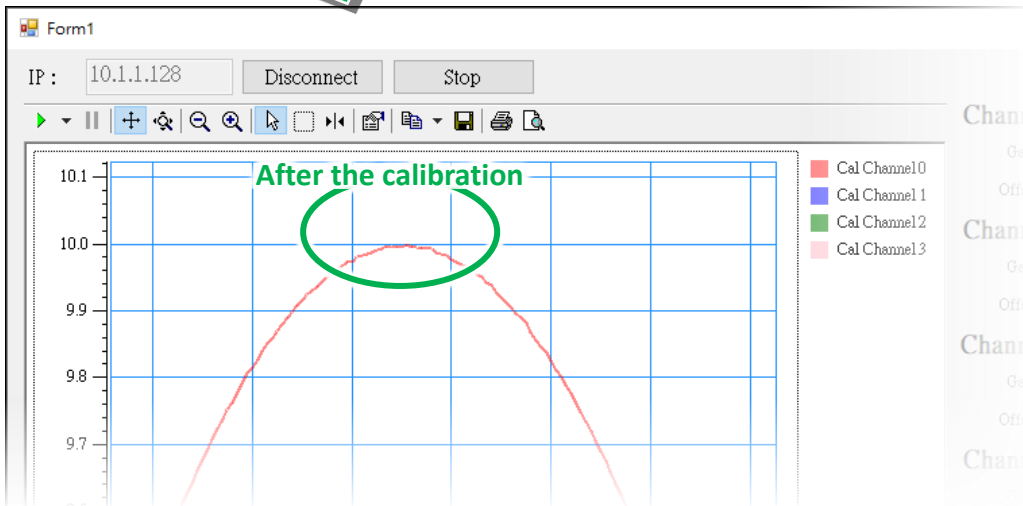
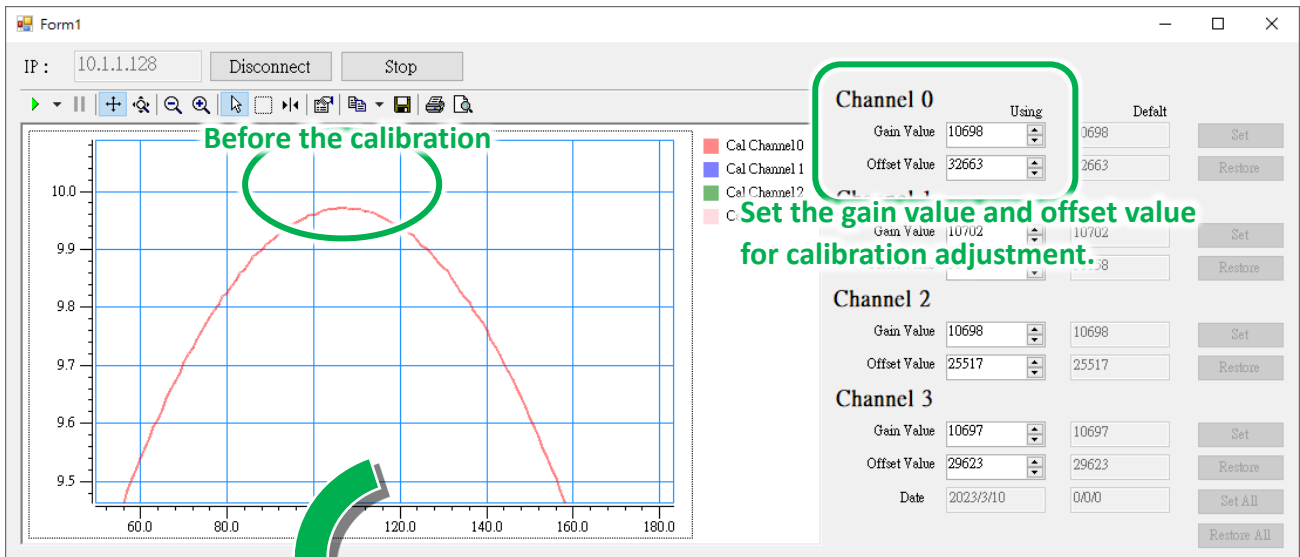

- **2's Complement (Hex) :**

## B. Troubleshooting

A number of common problems are easy to diagnose and fix if you know the cause.

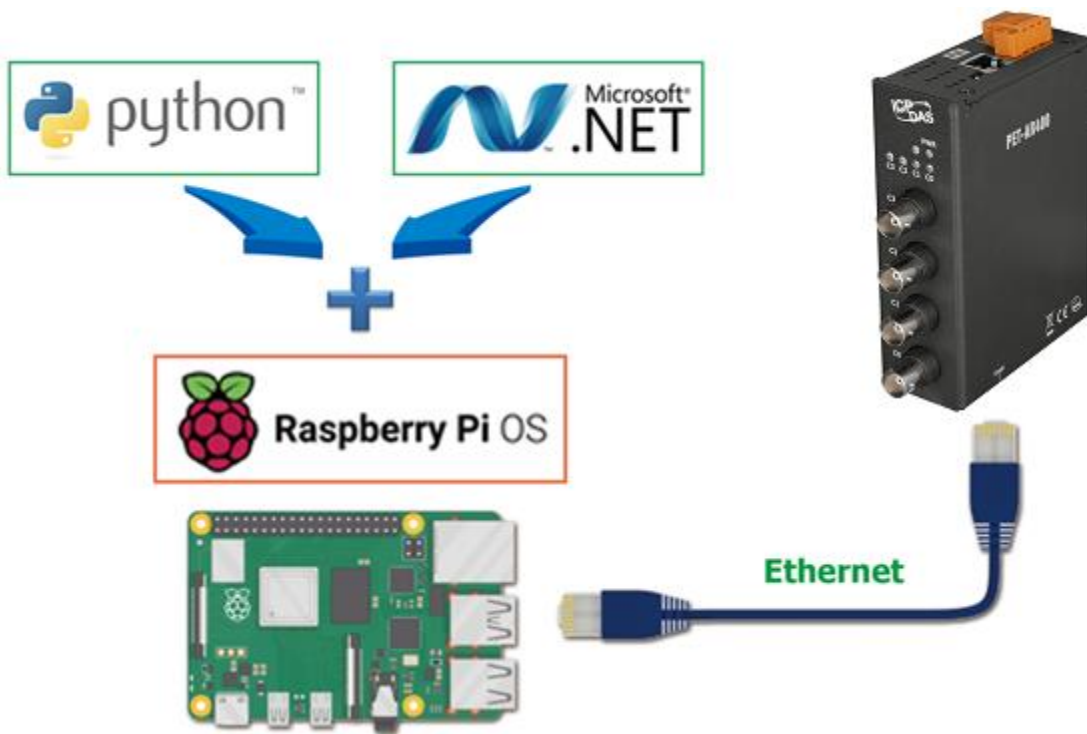

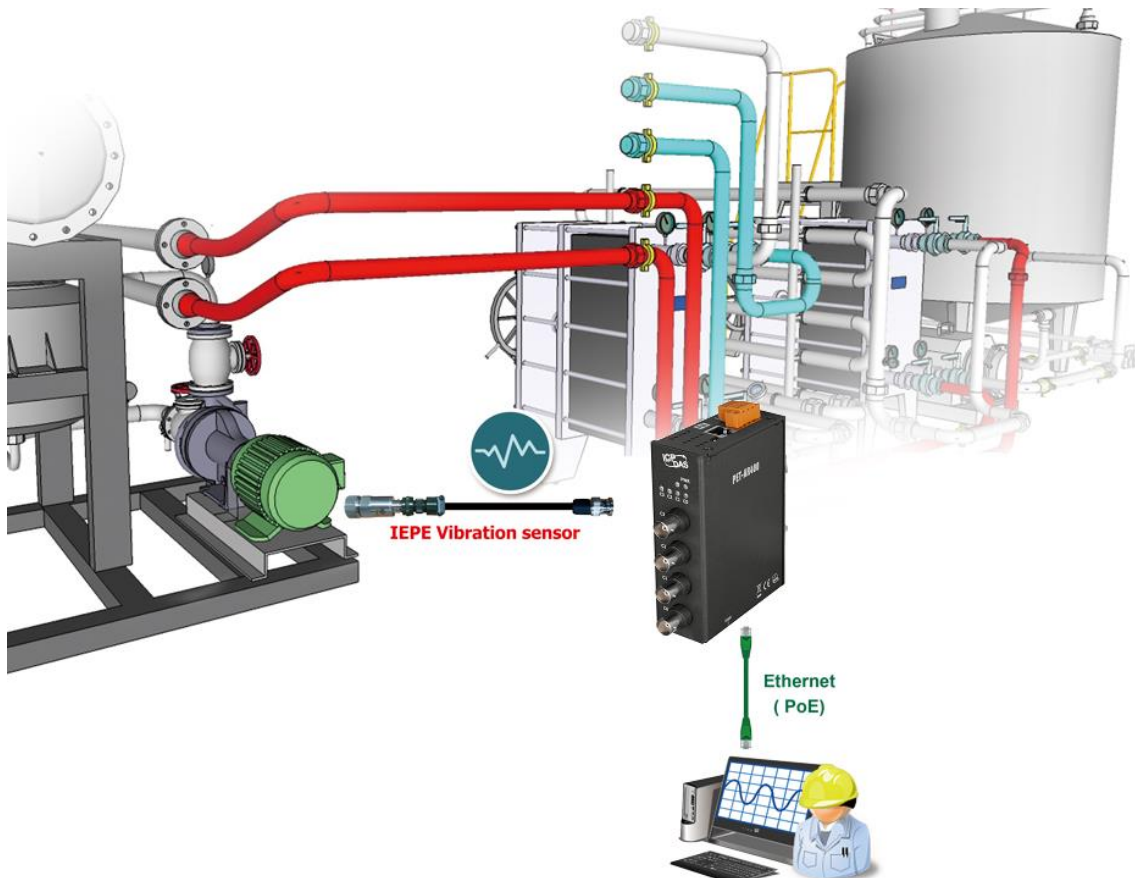
With python (the most popular development tool for the IoT) or Microsoft's cross-platform development tool .Net, it can provide products and various services more quickly.

Raspberry Pi users use the python/.Net library and sample programs provided by the ICP DAS high-speed data acquisition module platform to connect to the PET-7H16M/PET-7H24M to collect high-speed data for data analysis and IoT applications.



## C.2. Vibration High Speed Measurement Application

PET-AR400 can be connected to an IEPE Accelerometer to convert the signal into an analog voltage output with a general measurement range, and then transmit it to the data center system for processing and analysis through the Ethernet network.
